Interim Provost Susanna Maxwell announces the appointment of Walter Hopkins as the interim dean of the College of Engineering and Technology. Hopkins' appointment will begin July 1, and continue until a permanent dean is appointed. The search for a permanent dean will begin early in the fall 2002. Hopkins received his Ph.D. from Auburn University, and his MSEE and BSEE from the University of Alabama. He also is licensed as a professional engineer.

Hopkins, professor of electrical engineering, has been at NAU since 1983. He was associate dean from 1992-94, and chair of the Department of Electrical Engineering from 1990-93 and during the 1995-96 school year. Before coming to NAU, he taught at the University of Alabama, Tuscaloosa, and the University of Petroleum and Minerals, Dhahran, Saudi Arabia.

He also has had industry experience at NASA and Lockheed Missiles and Space Company in Huntsville, Ala., as well as consulting experience with the U.S. Bureau of Mines in Tuscaloosa, Ala.

His research interests are primarily on computer analysis and modeling, especially control systems. He has developed new methods of analyzing nonlinear systems using a frequency response approach as well as a method of detecting trapped underground miners by way of a low frequency transmitter contained in the battery pack. He also was active in developing the freshman components of NAU's award-winning Design4Practice course sequence.

Ted Peterson (294) – Coppola!

FRANCIS COPPOLA'S VIRTUAL STUDIO OPTIONS SCREENPLAY WRITERS, ACTORS, ARTISTS FIND COMMUNITY & OPPORTUNITY ON WEB

In 2000, five-time Oscar winner Francis Ford Coppola expanded his presence on the web and fulfilled a 20-year ambition by re-opening his legendary ZOETROPE STUDIOS at www.zoetrope.com. Coppola recently posted a message on the website's public forum saying he was looking for a horror genre screenplay to option. American Zoetrope had recently produced the box office hit Jeepers Creepers last summer, and a sequel, Like Hell: Jeepers Creepers 2, is already in the works.

Soon after the posting, dozens of horror screenplays flooded the site, and Monster, by brothers Ted and Michael Peterson, was optioned by American Zoetrope. The script combines horror with a strong comedic element. A group of friends camping in the northern California redwoods find themselves trapped in an abandoned gold mine with a strange subterranean creature... and they're running out of gin. The Petersons have been writing screenplays together in their spare time for three years. Since 1993, Ted has been

writing dialogue and designs for computer games, finally landing his first position as lead designer for one of the top selling adventure titles of 1996, "Daggerfall." Since graduating from college and coming out to L.A. to live with his big brother, Michael has worked on several TV shows and features, including Frank Darabont's 1999 hit movie, The Green Mile. "I joined the American Zoetrope website years ago, mostly to workshop short stories," says Ted. "But when Coppola posted a message on the public forum saying he was specifically looking for a horror screenplay to option, I had to submit 'Monster.'"

"We received other bites from people interested in optioning 'Monster,'" says Michael. "But when a production company as well-respected as American Zoetrope says they like what you've written and are interested in producing it, you gotta say yes."

Coppola's Virtual studio also recently issued a casting call for Like Hell: Jeepers Creepers 2. Actors were invited to post a photograph, audio performance and resume -a multi-media "head shot." "American Zoetrope has always been known for finding new talent, and the Virtual Studio really opens up the process for all artists," said Francis Coppola. "It allows us to see and hear the actor and tells you immediately if you want to see more. It has also spawned a great deal of collaboration, which to me, is one of its most exciting aspects." Francis Coppola founded American Zoetrope in 1969 with the notion that the future of cinema was electronic. Under Coppola's leadership and philosophy, American Zoetrope has produced a library of award-winning films, including American Graffiti, The Godfather Parts II & III, The Black Stallion, The Outsiders, Rumble Fish, Peggy Sue Got Married, Barfly, The Conversation, Apocalypse Now, Bram Stoker's Dracula, Don Juan DeMarco, Mi Familia and the recent hit , The Virgin Suicides. The introduction of www.zoetrope.com, an entirely web-based and electronic film studio, brings Coppola's vision of Electronic Cinema into reality.
