Because of the growth of the Chapter and the expanded kitchen operation, we have hired a housemother, Linda Campbell, who will be managing the kitchen and assisting the House Corporation with on-site management of the physical plant.

As many of you know, our Chapter House now sits beside the stadium plaza, the new main entrance to Bryant-Denny Stadium, giving us the premier location on campus. e have a busy year ahead of us at Alabama Alpha. Recruitment is under way as pledgeship started the middle of September. We recruited 17 new members, bringing our total membership close to 50 and enabling Phi Kappa Psi to compete with the larger fraternities on campus. To ensure we remain active throughout the community, many philanthropic events have been planned for this fall. We will participate with Habitat for Humanity, the Boys and Girls Clubs, Relay for Life, and many other volunteer organizations. With a newly renovated house, several new members, and a higher G.P.A., I am confident this year will be even better than the last.

High Academic Achievements by Members

This past spring, Alabama Alpha finished with a G.P.A. of 2.85, which is higher than the all men's average. We continue to strive for our Chapter goal of 3.0. ALABAMA ALPHA FOUNDER ENJOYS LIFELONG FRIENDSHIPS AND SERVING CHAPTER

Alumnus Spotlight—Tryon Hubbard '64

s one of the first initiates of Alabama Alpha, **John "Tryon" Hubbard '64** has an interesting story to tell. When Tryon arrived at The University of Alabama in 1960, he briefly met with a couple of fraternities, but none seemed to offer much that could keep his interest. Tryon went his own way, focused on freshman engineering studies (which he would later change to electrical engineering), and kept plenty busy. Midway through his sophomore year, friends told Tryon of a new fraternity that was forming on campus, a fraternity that intended to be somehow different than the exist-



ing ones. This intrigued him, so he went to a meeting. "I met guys with similar interests. That, plus the challenge of actually starting something new, was plenty to hold my interest."

Tryon grew very close to a group of guys who have remained his friends throughout life. Phi Psi gave him a unique opportunity to learn to work with a group and to organize toward common goals. It also gave him the experience of contributing to the achievement of a major goal that originated from scratch.

Upon graduation, Tryon was commissioned as a second lieutenant in the U.S. Army and served two years on active duty. Afterward, he worked for the Boeing Company in Huntsville, Alabama, as a guidance and control system engineer on the Saturn V/Apollo moon rocket and the Skylab space station. Then Tryon joined a small company consisting of 35 people, M&S Computing, which became Intergraph Corporation and grew to 10,000 people worldwide and Fortune 500 status. The company grew and changed throughout his 23 years, and Tryon did a variety of different jobs ranging from programming to marketing. Tryon and his wife Elaine, also opened Theater 'Round the Corner, a small, professional theater in Huntsville, Alabama. In 1999, he decided it was time to retire.

Tryon has some words of wisdom to pass on to his younger Alabama Alpha brothers: "Every successful organization needs good leaders, but it also needs good followers. Followers exercise leadership in their own way by being good role models for others. Everyone needs to consider their gifts and find out how to use those gifts for the greater good. The Chapter is a workshop for your personal development; use it well."

Some of Tryon's favorite memories of school are Farley's Farm, getting Phi Psi's charter, the Woods Hall parking lot, great socials, three national football championships, and "quality time with my Chapter brothers."

Now Tryon spends his time serving as national treasurer of Phi Kappa Psi and chairman for the Alabama Alpha Foundation. He helped to implement a program providing scholarships for members who live in the Chapter House and maintain a G.P.A. of 3.5 or above.

Tryon and his wife of 20 years, Elaine, have two children; Perry (36) works for Sherwin Williams and lives in Huntsville, Alabama, with his wife, Sarah. Rob (33) works for Pratt and Whitney in Hartford, Connecticut. Stay in touch with Tryon by e-mailing him at john@jehubbard.com.
